## HE HOUSE WAS AS PLAIN

as a dressmaker's model: white walls, white ceilings, a cut-and-paste contractors' kitchen. Other potential buyers had dismissed it. Then Veronica Swanson Beard showed up. The fashion designer, one-half of the sister-in-law duo behind the Veronica Beard label, has that enviable eye that can not only pick out the coolest treasure in a shop full of flotsam but also look at a blank canvas and see pure poten-

tial. To her the 15-year-old house had the bones to become a second home for her family: husband Jamie and their three sons.

"It's sturdy and well-built," says Swanson Beard, "and the location is amazing-close to town and right on the bike path, which gives the boys so much freedom." Her family had been renting summer properties on the island for a couple of years and had no interest in a ships-ahoy-style beach house. "I envisioned us here in the off-season," she notes, "and I wanted our place to feel cozy and layered."

Even before she saw the property, Swanson Beard knew whom she would enlist for help creating this atmosphere of warmth: Michelle Holland of Nantucket House Antiques & Interior Design Studios. "I'd go into her shop and just daydream," says Swanson Beard. "I was obsessed—I wanted a house with wallpaper like this, floors like that."

And so, during a single off-season, the pair went about giving the Beards' new house an old soul. The first step was adding a patina of age to walls and floors. Hand-printed muslin wallpaper by artist Kevin Paulsen was hung above wood paneling layered with plaster

and rubbed, painted, and glazed for a timeworn look. Mostly decorative brass furniture tacks were yet another way to add imperfection and character to walls. Paulsen also painted a checkerboard grid of abstract, espresso brown swirls on the downstairs floors; upstairs, the bedroom flooring was splatter-painted, each in its own palette of five distinct colors.

As for furnishings Swanson Beard came well stocked.

"I'm a collector," she says, noting that her Long Island,
New York, house includes a "working garage" full of finds.
Holland laughs as she recalls the day the Beards' shipment
arrived. "It was a nice day, and we laid it all out on the lawn:
mirrors, rugs, bamboo shelves, side tables, chairs," she says.

"We fixed, restored, rewired, and used almost everything."
There were, of course, gaps to fill, with Swanson Beard's

furniture in the open-plan gathering areas. In the living space, a large vintage sofa—upholstered in shades of sea glass green, claret, and Nantucket red—mingles with a giant Lucite coffee table from the 1970s, vintage wicker and rattan furniture, and Swanson Beard's collection of shell boxes. Holland furnished the dining area with a broad gateleg table and sturdy Windsor chairs and found capacious storage pieces, such as an antique Canadian cabinet, where Swanson Beard stashes her extensive collections of dishware ("I collect majolica like crazy," she says) and table linens.

On the walls went collections of shadow box ships, "woolies" (needlework sailing scenes), and Alfred Birdsey watercolors. Vivid lampshades were made from shirred

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sari fabrics and abalone shells, sailors' lunch buckets, and vintage sap buckets to reflect the island's spirit and history.

The pair "nipped and tucked right up until the end," says the designer. The sofa in the den was adjusted like a couture gown, its pleated skirt and arms going through several iterations before being deemed finished. To the custom Plain English kitchen, they added glazed tiles without grout to give the walls more rhythm. "We were each other's last text at night and first phone call in the morning," says Holland. "We just got into this groove."

In her professional life, Swanson Beard designs and curates a label known not just for blending the perfectly

tailored with the wildly bohemian but also for cultivating a strong sense of place in its brick-and-mortar shops all over the country, incorporating artwork and furnishings with distinct local flavors. It's no wonder, then, Swanson Beard fell for Nantucket, an island with history layering classic Quaker simplicity, artisanal craftsmanship, and an influx of exotic global influences, thanks to its centuries-old whaling industry. "The surface of this place has gotten very polished, very resort," says Holland. "But there's still an element of the creative survivor soul that made Nantucket what it is. This is what Veronica fell in love with, the true energy of this island." ◆
